at →	<u>in</u>	on ↓	no preposition
<p>a specific point in time e.g. at the moment</p> <p>times e.g. at 6 o'clock</p> <p>festivals e.g. at Easter</p> <p>night (this is an exception) e.g. at night</p> <p>the weekend (this is an exception) e.g. at the weekend</p>	<p>a period of time e.g. in the middle of winter</p> <p>months e.g. in January</p> <p>seasons e.g. in winter</p> <p>years e.g. in 2010</p> <p>a decade e.g. in the 1990s</p> <p>a century e.g. in the 20th century</p>	<p>days e.g. on Monday</p> <p>dates e.g. on the 1st of January</p>	<p>this e.g. I'm moving this week.</p> <p>next e.g. See you next week.</p> <p>last e.g. I saw her last week.</p> <p>today e.g. I'm moving today.</p> <p>tomorrow e.g. See you tomorrow.</p> <p>yesterday e.g. I saw her yesterday.</p>
